**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF NEVADA CITY

WHEREAS, at direction of the CABY Fiscal Oversight Committee (i.e., the water agencies who have funded CABY since 2007), CABY staff approached the City in mid-October, 2010 to explore the possibility of the City of Nevada City acting as official applicant for the CABY application to the State of California Department of Water Resources (DWR) CABY Proposition 84 Integrated Regional Water Management Program (IRWMP)– Implementation Grant – Round 1; and

WHEREAS, in order for CABY to access Proposition 84 IRWMP grant funds, a single CABY member must apply in the name of the IRWMP as applicant which may be either a governmental agency or a non-profit organization; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Nevada City, that application be made to the California Department of Water Resources to obtain an Integrated Management Implementation Grant pursuant to the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2006 (Public Resource Code Section 75001 *et. seq.*), and to enter into an agreement to receive a grant for the CABY Proposition 84 Integrated Regional Water Management Grant Program – Implementation Grant – Round 1.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor or City Manager of the City of Nevada City are hereby authorized and directed to prepare the necessary data, conduct investigations, file such application, and execute a grant agreement with the California Department of Water Resources.

CABY AND NEVADA CITY

Since its inception in 2006, CABY has required that its efforts at supporting project development and packaging projects for IRWMP-restricted grant applications be limited to organizations and agencies which have adopted the CABY Integrated Regional Water Management Plan (IRWMP). Following outreach by CABY staff in late 2009, the City of Nevada City adopted the IRWMP on February 24, 2010.

As a result of IRWMP adoption by the City, CABY staff was empowered to work with City staff to develop projects for inclusion in various CABY funding applications, with a specific focus on the Proposition 84 funding cycle. City and CABY staff had already begun discussions about possible projects, so the conversation continued and built on previous work. Several focused work sessions and meetings were held in the late spring of 2010, to accelerate the project development process. Additionally, because the City is considered to be a disadvantaged community (DAC), CABY staff was authorized to provide extensive project development support (to the extent of preparation of all essential grant application materials) directly to the City without compensation.

IMPLEMENTATION GRANT – NEVADA CITY PROJECT

Tentatively titled “Nevada City Comprehensive Water Conservation and System Efficiency Program” the project includes a variety of components, including: installing an integrated SCADA system (with altitude valves) on storage tanks, improving segments of the Pine Street/Prospect Street/Park Avenue distribution systems, installing meters on city facilities, purchasing leak detection equipment and training city staff to use equipment, replacing a targeted number of fire hydrants and preparing a comprehensive water conservation plan.

NEVADA CITY AS PROPOSITION 84 IMPLEMENTATION GRANT APPLICANT

At the direction of the CABY Fiscal Oversight Committee (i.e., the water agencies who have funded CABY since 2007), CABY staff approached the City in mid-October to explore the possibility of the City acting as official applicant for the CABY application to the State of California Department of Water Resources (DWR) CABY Proposition 84 Integrated Regional Water Management Grant Program - Implementation Grant - Round 1.

In order for CABY to access Prop 84 IRWMP grant funds, a single CABY member must apply in the name of the IRWMP as applicant. The applicant can be either a government agency or a non-profit organization.

Being a part of the application does not require the City to be the applicant. NID is prepared to take on the role of applicant, if necessary. However, having the City as applicant addresses a long-held aspiration for the group of having a CABY member who is not an Urban Water Agency (more than 3000 hookups) act as a project applicant. In addition, having a DAC as the applicant is perceived as a plus with the State.

The application itself can have a single project or multiple projects, as long as the "suite" of projects has been reviewed and approved by the governance group for the IRWMP (in this case the CABY Planning Committee or PC). The CABY PC gave final approval to a suite of projects, including the Nevada City project, at their meeting in June of 2010. Table 1 presents a list of the approved projects, a brief description of the project components and a tentative budget for each project

NID AND CABY STAFF SUPPORT FOR NEVADA CITY

NID will act as the fiscal agent for the project and will submit and process all invoices and disburse all funds from the project. As a result, Nevada City will not have to develop the systems to support the invoicing, billing and project accounting to meet the standards of the State. NID has served as the fiscal agent for CABY since 2007 and has all the necessary administrative, reporting and staffing systems to support such an effort.

CABY staff will act as consulting support staff to Nevada City for the duration of the grant. CABY staff has administered several other projects funded under similar State grant programs and has considerable experience in supporting small government entities with the administrative (i.e., non-legal) aspects of project management. CABY staff will also act as liaison between each of the project sponsors and both Nevada City and NID. CABY staff will also coordinate all reporting and invoicing activities for NID. CABY staff will make regular reports to both the City Manager and (as requested) to the City Council. Funds to support the City's staff required to assist in coordination will be included in the grant application.

STATE OF CALIFORNIA-DEPARTMENT OF WATER RESOURCES GRANT AGREEMENT

The Prop 84 funding cycle opened in March of 2010 with the final guidelines published in August. The August guidelines identified a January 7, 2011 deadline for submittal of grant applications to the state, through the Department of Water Resources (DWR). As expected, the guidelines require a substantial bit of work in order for a project application to be successful. Attachment 1 provides an overview of the required application components.

The grant agreement form to be used by the state has not yet been posted online. However, conversations with state staff indicate that the agreement used for Prop 50 will likely be the template. The Prop 50 agreement assumed that the applicant would sign a contract with the state and then would develop individual agreements with each project sponsor. Again, CABY staff has coordinated such an effort in the past and has already sent the Prop 50 agreement to each of the project sponsors, as well as the City Manager, to ensure their ability to negotiate and sign such an agreement.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF NEVADA CITY ENDORING AND ADOPTING THE COSUMNES-AMERICAN-BEAR-YUBA RIVERS INTEGRATED REGIONAL WATER MANAGEMENT PLAN (IRWMP)

WHEREAS, population growth in the State of California will continue to pressure water resources and balancing the needs of urban, agricultural, environmental, and recreational water supplies will be a challenge for all involved in water management; and

WHEREAS, the Cosumnes-American-Bear-Yuba Rivers (CABY) planning region consists of the foothill and upper watershed of the Cosumnes, American, Bear, and Yuba Rivers; and

WHEREAS, the CABY Planning Committee's diverse group of public agencies, water providers, agriculture, business, residential users, community recreation, and environmental organizations and tribal interests have jointly developed this Integrated Regional Water Management Plan (IRWMP); and

WHEREAS, the IRWMP serves as a voluntary planning document that identifies a broadly supported vision, guiding principles, goals, and objectives, and projects to enhance the beneficial uses of water for the CABY region; and

WHEREAS, this collaborative planning effort is intended to formulate water management strategies for the region and priorities projects that address watershed and regional issues, coordinate with other IRWMPs, address local, state, and federal plans' priorities, achieve multiple benefits, encompass more than one watershed, and meet short and long term water resource needs; and

WHEREAS, CABY Planning Committee members are formulating a cooperative governance structure necessary to implement the IRWMP that is favorable to all local governments, water suppliers, business groups, environmentalists, agriculture, recreation, and citizens; and

WHEREAS, an integrated regional approach to water management will streamline individual efforts and increase efficiencies, the CABY IRWMP will also increase partnership, collaboration, and organizational capacity. Collaborative management will provide a forum for stakeholder input and support for projects that address the common goals and objectives for the CABY region; and

WHEREAS, this regional planning effort will improve regional competitiveness for grant funding for projects and efforts to implement the IRWMP and achieve agency or organizational goals; and

WHEREAS, participants in the City of Nevada City have engaged in the CABY process, have attended CABY Planning Committee meetings, have met with CABY staff to develop projects for inclusion in the IRWMP and have a genuine interest in working with CABY to advance their own as well as regional goals and objective and have reported on issues discussed to the City Council of Nevada City; and

WHEREAS, the IRWMP has been finalized in accordance with the Department of Water Resources Proposition 50 Guidelines; and

WHEREAS, the IRWMP is not a legally binding document, but will serve as a regional compact with commitments to work together as a region to implement the Plan; and

WHEREAS, the IRWMP references many plans, however the entities that adopt the IRWMP do not necessarily endorse all the plans that are referenced; and

WHEREAS, the IRWMP will be a living document, reviewed, and updated over time, individual signatories can remain involved or terminate their involvement at any time.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Nevada City hereby adopts the CABY IRWMP as a complete, voluntary document that provides broadly supported identified goals objectives, strategies, and projects to meet the integrated water needs of people and the rivers of the CABY region now and into the future.

ORDINANCE NO. 2010-XX

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE BAIL SCHEDULE
ATTACHED AS EXHIBIT 'A' BAIL OF SECTION 10.28.600 OF
CHAPTER 10.28 OF TITLE 10 OF THE NEVADA CITY MUNICIPAL CODE
INCREASING FINES FOR PARKING VIOLATIONS**

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 76000 imposes surcharges to local jurisdictions on parking citation revenues to be allocated to the County of Nevada for local Courthouse and Criminal Justice Facilities Construction Funds and to the State Court Facilities Construction Fund and, effective January 1, 2009, the State increased those total surcharges to a total surcharge of \$9.50 for each parking violation penalty collected, and,

WHEREAS, the City Council by Resolution Nos. 2009-13 and 2009-28 sought to increase parking penalties by \$5.00 to allow for recovery of the increased State surcharges and to Amend the Bail Schedule attached as Exhibit A to Municipal Code Section 10.28.600 to reflect this \$5.00 increase, but in changing the format of the Exhibit omitted some violations and unintentionally lowered some bail amounts, notably those involving DMV holds, and

WHEREAS, Now, SB 857 imposes an additional \$3.00 surcharge, effective December 7, 2010 to fund trial court operations, necessitating another increase in parking penalties to allow recovery of that increase, and

WHEREAS, the City Council is empowered to impose reasonable fees, rates, and charges to offset the costs for municipal services and it desires set bail and fines for violations to allow recovery of State surcharges and to correct prior amendments,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEVADA CITY HEREBY ORDAINS that Exhibit A to Section 10.28.600 of Chapter 10.28 of Title 10 of the Nevada City Municipal Code is amended to establish the bail schedule attached hereto and incorporated herein, effective as soon after December 7, 2010, as permitted by law.

Local Parking Fee Increase Goes into effect Dec. 7

Cities with parking enforcement should take note of the operational date for a new \$3 fee on all parking citations collected by local agencies to fund trial court operations included as part of the FY 2010-11 budget. As provided in SB 857, the courts funding trailer bill, the new fee "shall become operative 60 days after the enactment of the Budget Act of 2010."

While the courts funding trailer bill was only just signed on Oct. 19, the Budget Act of 2010 (SB 870) was signed on Oct. 8. This places the operational date for the \$3 parking citation fee on Dec. 7 – 60 days after the Budget Act of 2010 was signed, and not 60 days from the date of SB 857 being signed.

These provisions will sunset on July 1, 2013 unless subsequent legislation or budget proposals extend or repeal the sunset date. The new fee increases the existing \$4.50 parking citation fee that local agencies collect and transmit to the state, which was enacted in 2008 to fund court construction and operations.

The League is working with the State Controllers Office and the Judicial Council to verify other implementation details for this fee.

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
